The Methodist Church in the 1800s

In the nineteenth century, "the people called Methodist," both English speaking and German, played a crucial role in our nation's growth and its push westward. Six forms of ministry were especially prominent.

Circuit Riders: Many preachers were appointed to ride a circuit, a loop of small frontier communities, often hundreds of miles around. The pastor preached, distributed literature from saddlebags, delivered letters, helped establish new congregations, and brought news of the larger world. It was not an easy life. The salary at one point was set at \$64 a year and half of the preachers died before they turned 30.

Camp Meetings: Early in the century a new religious form appeared, the annual camp meeting. Settlers from miles around would come with their wagons and tents, staying for a week or so. Evangelistic preachers of several denominations would stand on tree stumps or special platforms, proclaiming a vivid and emotional call to repentance and acceptance of God's grace. The often-electrifying response brought many conversions and spread a vast spiritual revival across frontier America.

Sunday School: The Sunday school began in England in the late 18th century to teach children of the nation's poor to read and write, to also teach the Christian faith, and to teach how to make moral choices. Wesley adopted it for the Methodists, and in the 19th century it spread rapidly across America. In congregations that were visited by a preacher only once in several weeks or months, the Sunday school was the chief means for Christian instruction and learning. Though called a school, the purpose in America was mostly evangelistic, not educational as in England. In the latter part of the century, Methodists joined with other denominations in the cooperative development of lessons for all ages.

Publishing: The Americas followed Wesley's practice of distributing Christian literature, especially

needed with such a widely scattered population. In 1789 The Methodist Book Concern was founded to keep the circuit riders supplied with literature. The Evangelical named a book agent in 1816. Later, the Evangelical Press and the Otterbein Press served all the German-speaking churches. From these small beginnings the publishing enterprise grew into the United Methodist Publishing House (Cokesbury), located in Nashville, TN.


Missions: Thomas Coke, whom Wesley ordained and sent to America, is often called the father of Methodist missionary outreach. He challenged the church to share the gospel with others, and in 1804, the Methodists named him the general superintendent of all missions. The Missionary Society of the Evangelical Association was formed in 1839. One of the outstanding missionaries to Native Americans was John Stewart, an African-American preacher among the Wyandot people of the Midwest. The first Methodist missionary abroad arrived in Liberia in 1819. Work in China and India began at mid-century. By the late 19th century, missionaries were at work around the globe, with strong support from American congregations, Sunday people's schools, young groups, and women's organizations. New congregations were established, as well as countless hospitals, clinics, schools, colleges, and orphanages.

Schools: In the United States of America, the church was also at work founding schools and universities. The Methodist General Conference of 1820 urged annual conferences to develop colleges; by 1850 a number were functioning, many of which endure today. In Virginia some of the Methodist schools are Randolph-Macon, Randolph-Macon Women's College, Virginia Wesleyan, Shenandoah, Emory & Henry, Ferrum...other schools you will know are Albright, Allegheny, American U., Baldwin-Wallace, Bethune, Boston U., Brevard, DePauw, Dickinson, Drew, Duke, Emory, Greensboro, Lebanon, Millsaps, Ohio Wesleyan, Otterbein, Pheiffer, Southern Methodist, Denver, University of the Pacific, Wesleyan, Wofford, and Meharry Medical College, just to name a few. There are now 123 colleges, universities, seminaries and professional and secondary schools with United Methodist Apportionments from every Methodist church in America help support and maintain these schools...AMEN.


