For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. Ephesians 3:14-15

Consider with me the joy of bowing. Bowing is not in fashion as it once was. There was once a courtliness in people's manners, and people bowed to one another, as well as to God, the altar, the flag. When I was a child my parents sent me to a school where all the boys wore beanies. Can you imagine my bowling ball head crammed into a beanie? Anyway, we were taught, among many other things, how to shake hands and how to bow properly. forgotten I've never instructions...although I don't practice the bowing except around my Asian friends. I think Asians can be a bit more practiced in courtesy, and they invariably bow to one another...the younger you are the lower you bow to persons older. One of my former Asian associate pastors told me he always practices the 5 second rule...bow and hold for 5 seconds.


Of course, there is a new independence afoot in the world today. Some young people find bowing demeaning and simply refuse to do it. Think with me today about the spirit of bowing- the spirit of acceptance, compliance, humility, and deference. In our highly competitive society and part of the world, bowing may be a terrific way of expressing our common humanity, our sense of reverence for life, recognition of the value of others, and for the Creator and all creation. It is physically pleasant to bow because it redistributes our weight and eases strain on the back. Bowing is also a graceful act, acknowledging

the existence of grace and relationship to the world. Try it today. Bow your head at your table or desk and say a little prayer. Bow toward the sun (if it actually breaks through the clouds this week), the life-giving center of our solar system. Bow toward a beautiful tree, indicating your pleasure in its being there. Bow toward your family and loved ones, to show your humility before the power of love and relationships. This week let bowing become part of your daily expression. You may find life a little more pliable and a little more pleasant.

Bedding Needed for Armenia

In a recent Sunday School class we talked about the humility of Jesus as He was crucified on the cross. It reminded me as I try to live in the kingdom of



God, how I need (and maybe all of us need) to practice a great deal more humility. This Lenten and Easter Season, we at HUMC have the opportunity to live out our humility by helping people in Armenia. Brian Mateer, Director of Missions at Western N.C. Methodist Churches, spoke to the Wednesday Night Fellowship about the church program that he supports in Armenia. In Armenia, approximately 26% of the people live below the poverty level. Also, there is much tension in the country because the countries around them always want their land and often try to take land by force. Many lives are in a state of uncertainty. Right now, there is a large influx of Russian refugees who are fleeing Putin and his tyranny. Armenia is a Christian country, so the churches are helping with the refugees that are coming to Armenia and it has been draining their resources. They are trying to furnish basic sleeping and shelter arrangements and they particularly need funds for bedding items like sheets, towels, mattresses, etc. They are asking for monetary donations to purchase the needed items and this would help to boost their economy.

This Lenten Season, can we think about practicing our humility by giving our gifts to Armenia in secret, to people who will never know of your help? Doesn't it make you glad when you think that Jesus will be pleased with your efforts?

and dresses for needy girls around the world. We are able to buy the supplies for all these projects thanks to your support of our holiday bazaar last year. Thank you!


