When A Person Reflects on Jesus

When a person reflects on Jesus' ministry, what emerges with bracing clarity is the comprehensive nature of his vision. He never intended to put a patch on an old garment, nor new wine in old wineskins. He wasn't a religious reformer, bringing better readings and interpretations to the Torah. He wasn't a revolutionary, attempting to replace one repressive power with another. Jesus went beyond reformation and revolution. His struggle was against the basic principles of the system of power and domination. Violent revolution always fails because it isn't revolutionary enough. It changes the rulers but not the rules, the ends but not the means. Most of the old repressive values, myths and delusional assumptions not only remain intact but they also get reemployed. What Jesus envisioned was a world transformed, where both people and the powers that be are in harmony with the Ultimate - and committed toward the general welfare of humankind - what some prefer to call the Kingdom of God.

If Jesus Christ had never lived, we would not have been able to invent him. The world, and especially the church, had no categories for such fundamental change. It is no wonder that the radicality of Jesus was soon watered down by the church: Catholic and Protestant. The church has been all too often the power trying to extinguish his light, but his truth has proven to be inextinguishable. We're living in the 21st century and much is changing in the world, and the church of Jesus Christ. Whatever we call the coming new order of God, we know that however long it takes to become a reality on earth, the values Jesus Christ articulated will be the values the Kingdom of God exemplifies. **AMEN**.

Bedding Needed for Armenia

In a recent Sunday School class we talked about the humility of Jesus as He was crucified on the cross. It reminded me as I try to live in the kingdom of



God, how I need (and maybe all of us need) to practice a great deal more humility. This Lenten and Easter Season, we at HUMC have the opportunity to live out our humility by helping people in Armenia. Brian Mateer, Director of Missions at Western N.C. Methodist Churches, spoke to the Wednesday Night Fellowship about the church program that he supports in Armenia. In Armenia, approximately 26% of the people live below the poverty level. Also, there is much tension in the country because the countries around them always want their land and often try to take land by force. Many lives are in a state of uncertainty. Right now, there is a large influx of Russian refugees who are fleeing Putin and his tyranny. Armenia is a Christian country, so the churches are helping with the refugees that are coming to Armenia and it has been draining their resources. They are trying to furnish basic sleeping and shelter arrangements and they particularly need funds for bedding items like sheets, towels, mattresses, etc. They are asking for monetary donations to purchase the needed items and this would help to boost their economy. 
