Human Responsibility and Negligence

"So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets. "Enter by the narrow gate. For the gate is wide and the way is easy that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few.

Matthew 7:12-14

The impact of the Covid 19 pandemic the past few years got me thinking about divine providence and how God may be seen in all this.

Many conditions of life around the world are at least partly the result of our neglect or refusal to take advantage of the ability God has provided you and me to care for our own and others' safety and welfare. If a plane crashes, should we ask why God let it happen or why safety measures were not adequate or enforced? If millions of people around the world are hungry or homeless, should we ask why God allows people to starve or rather why we do? Human negligence, selfishness, and unconcern cause many of the terrible things that happen to people and some credit God for these events. And yet, human intelligence and good will can remedy many of the forms human suffering take.

Often tragedy and suffering come along that no one can prevent and no one is responsible for. We don't have to torment ourselves by assuming that misfortune is always anyone's fault, anxiously asking: "Who let this happen?" And it is cruel to allow or encourage others to torment themselves with the suggestion that their misfortune and suffering are always their own fault, the consequence of

something they've either done or not done. Nothing is so unfair as our blaming the victims. Nevertheless, sometimes misfortune and suffering are clearly the consequence of our neglect or refusal to provide for our own nation's general health and the welfare of our citizens, and it doesn't help to ignore or deny it. Even in such cases, Christians can remind ourselves and others of a God who doesn't hold grudges and seek vengeance but loves and forgives, a God who promises to be with us and for us in each and every situation we face as God's daughters and sons.

The Gospel of Mark portrays Jesus' ministry as threefold: preaching, teaching, and healing. Perhaps our entire world would be healthier if part of the mission of every nation is to provide for the healing and health of its citizens. The day will come when, in order to survive, we'll direct our focus to plowshares and pruning hooks and those things which make for a higher quality of life for us all. Jesus taught caring for others as a rule that's golden. He taught it and lived it. We'll remember and celebrate all he said and did during this holiest of Christian weeks.



Bedding Needed for Armenia

In a recent Sunday School class we talked about the humility of Jesus as He was crucified on the cross. It reminded me as I try to live in the kingdom of



God, how I need (and maybe all of us need) to practice a great deal more humility. This Lenten and Easter Season, we at HUMC have the opportunity to live out our humility by helping people in Armenia. Brian Mateer, Director of Missions at Western N.C. Methodist Churches, spoke to the Wednesday Night Fellowship about the church program that he supports in Armenia. In Armenia, approximately 26% of the people live below the poverty level. Also, there is much tension in the country because the countries around them always want their land and often try to take land by force. Many lives are in a state of uncertainty. Right now, there is a large influx of Russian refugees who are fleeing Putin and his tyranny. Armenia is a Christian country, so the churches are helping with the refugees that are coming to Armenia and it has been draining their resources. They are trying to furnish basic sleeping and shelter arrangements and they particularly need funds for bedding items like sheets, towels, mattresses, etc. They are asking for monetary donations to purchase the needed items and this would help to boost their economy. If you wish to donate, please write your check to Huguenot UMC with the note for Missions/Armenia.

This Lenten Season, can we think about practicing our humility by giving our gifts to Armenia in secret, to people who will never know of your help? Doesn't it make you glad when you think that Jesus will be pleased with your efforts?


