Unity and Diversity

And with great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. Acts 4:33

The book of Acts affirms that from the very beginning there was a strong church in Jerusalem. Soon, that very book moves on to other matters, and tells us very little about the later history of that early Jewish-Christian community. The rest of the New Testament offers a few other bits of insight. But it too deals mostly with the life of the church in other parts of the Roman Empire. Yet, by piecing together what the New Testament tells us with information gathered from other authors at that time, we arrive at a general idea regarding the life of the earliest Jewish-Christian community, and its later history.

In typical fashion, the earliest followers of Jesus were Jewish and it is often idealized. Peter's firmness and eloquence at Pentecost tend to eclipse his vacillation as to what ought to be done with the Gentiles who want to join the church. The possession of all things in common, commendable as it may be, did not abolish all the social and economic tensions between the various groups, for the Hellenists murmured against the Hebrews because their widows were neglected in the daily distribution, Acts 6:1.

These last words do not refer to a conflict between Jews and Gentiles, as you may assume, for Acts makes it very clear that at the time there were NO Gentiles in the church. It was rather a conflict between two groups of Jews, those who kept the customs and language of their ancestors, and those who showed more openness to Hellenistic, *Greek*, influences. In Acts, the first are called *Hebrews*, and the others are called the *Hellenists*. In response to this crisis, the twelve apostles called an assembly that appointed seven men *to serve tables*. Exactly what this meant is not altogether clear; although there is no doubt that the idea was that the seven would also have administrative tasks, and that the twelve would

continue with preaching and teaching. At any rate, it would seem that all seven were *Hellenists*, for they all had Greek names. So, the naming of the seven appears to be an attempt to give greater voice in the affairs of the church to the Hellenistic party, while the twelve, all Hebrews, would continue being the main preachers and teachers.

The seventh chapter of Acts tells the story of the first martyr of the faith, Stephen, one of the original seven. There is a hint in Acts 7 that Stephen's attitude toward the Temple was not entirely positive. So, the Jewish council, composed mostly of anti-Hellenistic Jews, refused to listen to him and condemned him to death. This contrasts with the treatment given by this same council to Peter and John, who were released after being caned and told to stop preaching. In addition, when open persecution finally erupted and followers of the Jesus Way had to flee Jerusalem, the apostles were allowed to remain. And, when Saul / Paul left for Damascus in pursuit of those who had taken refuge there, the apostles were still in Jerusalem, and Saul / Paul just ignored them. All this seems to indicate that the earliest persecutions were aimed mostly at the Hellenistic disciples and that the Hebrews had much less difficulty. It is later in Acts that King Herod, not the Jerusalem council, is the authority who ordered the death of James and the arrest of Peter.

Immediately following the death of Stephen, Acts turns its attention to another of the seven, Phillip, who founded the church in Samaria. Peter and John are sent to supervise the life of that new community. Thus, a church is being born beyond the confines of Judea, and that church, not founded by the apostles, still acknowledges their authority. This pattern would be repeated as the church extended beyond Jerusalem to new areas of the world.

By the 9th chapter, Acts becomes increasingly interested in Saul / Paul, and we hear less and less of the church in Jerusalem. What was happening was that God was using the persecuted and expelled from synagogue services Hellenistic Jewish Christians to serve as a bridge to the Gentile world, and because Gentiles were joining the church in such record numbers, they soon overshadowed the earlier Jewish Christian community.


